Awards

2010 International Medicine Award

This award recognizes an individual who has made a significant contribution to health in developing nations. The 2010 International Medicine Award recipient is Joe LeMaster, MD, MPH. Dr. LeMaster and his wife Judy lived in Nepal from 1990-2000, serving at Okhaldhunga Hospital, the only medical care facility for 300,000 people, promoting maternal-child health, and conducting leprosy research.

2010 HIV Leadership Award

This award recognizes a person who has made a significant contribution toward the control of HIV. The 2010 HIV Leadership Award Recipient is Thor Swanson, MD, MDiv, who served at Kijabe Hospital in Kenya during 2006-2007 and has also provided volunteer HIV care in Nepal, Tanzania, and Honduras.

2010 International Medicine Preceptor Award

This award recognizes an individual who has made an important impact in training future international health care volunteers. The 2010 International Medicine Preceptor Award recipient is Nancy Crigger, PhD, ARNP, an associate professor of nursing at William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo. For two decades, she has lead and instructed American nursing students in providing care in Central America.

2010 National Healthcare Service Award

This award is given to a citizen who is a role model in providing health care for his or her own people. The 2010 National Healthcare Service Award recipient is Rick Donlon, MD. In 1995, he and three classmates opened Christ Community Health Services, a primary-care health center in Memphis' most under served neighborhood. Since then, CCHS has grown to five locations, providing more than 95,000 patient visits and delivering 800 babies each year.

2010 Comninellis Award for Compassionate Service to Humanity

This award recognizes persons who demonstrate care and concern for the needy of the world, who give selflessly of their time and resources, and who inspire others to take similar action. The 2010 Comninellis Award for Compassionate Service to Humanity recipients are George Faile, Jr., MD, and Elizabeth Faile, RN, who have served for more than 20 years at the Baptist Medical Center in northern Ghana on the edge of the Sahara Desert.



Institute for International Medicine

On the outskirts of our communities exist extraordinary numbers of individuals and families who are forgotten. Often these are the poor, the unemployed, minorities, and immigrants. Overlooked by the majority and left behind in the dash for progress, these silent persons piece together lives from the leftovers, as they succumb to the physical

and mental repercussions of neglect. Some 2 billion of them still lack basic nutrition, housing, safe water, education, and health care. As a result, their infants only have a three in four chance of surviving beyond childhood, and those who do may live only into their 30s or 40s. Tragically, health in many poorer communities is actually on the decline. This should not be so!

Inspiring Assistance

The Good Samaritan is a moving account told by the Great Physician of a compassionate outsider coming to the aid of a common man who was

robbed, beaten, and left for dead. He urged, "Go and do likewise." Many health care professionals today continue to follow this model of kindness toward those who are most disadvantaged, making service to the poor an intentional part of their careers, whether in their home communities or in distant locales. Countless lives are saved through their ongoing commitment.

Critical Deficiencies

Health care professionals who serve on behalf of the forgotten often discover that their education and training poorly prepared them to work effectively among such people, primarily because of the following:

• **Health status** is largely determined by factors outside of mainstream health care, including education,

economic development, housing, and family planning.

- Health challenges are often distinct. Malnutrition, unique injuries, and certain infectious diseases are common in low-resource communities but rare in wealthier ones. And, resources to manage these diseases are frequently minimal.
- Cultural context is challenging. Success in promoting health and combating disease requires an intimate understanding of human behavior, which often contrasts sharply from one community to another.
- Leadership skills are underdeveloped. Effective health intervention requires attention to community-wide needs and

resources, team building, and strategic planning - concepts infrequently addressed in the education of health care professionals.

• Living and working in low-resource communities demands unique personal skills. Attention to physical health, emotional well-being, financial subjects, and family relationships is essential for long-term success.

Mission of INMED

The Institute for International Medicine (INMED) is a Missouri-registered, non-profit, educational corporation founded in 2003. INMED's mission is to equip health care professionals with the unique skills to serve forgotten people. Presently, INMED fulfills this mission through the following vital programs:

International Medicine Conferences and Symposiums

The INMED Exploring Medical Missions Conferences and Symposiums provide intense didactic education in the knowledge and skills necessary to successfully serve in poorer communities and across cultures. These conferences are accredited for continuing health care education and also provide attendees with opportunities to network with international health leaders and with outstanding service organizations.

Results to Date: Nearly 1,600 health care professionals, students, and associates have participated in the INMED Exploring Medical Missions Conferences & INMED Symposiums.

International Medicine, HIV Medicine, and Public Health Courses

International medicine relies upon a core set of knowledge and skills. Mastery of these helps to assure that health care professionals will be prepared for the unique challenges of serving low-resource communities. To this end, INMED offers:

- INMED online courses in International Medicine, International HIV Medicine and International Public Health. All courses are self-paced, interactive, and designed for both students and experienced professionals who are new to these fields.
- INMED Intensive Courses in International Medicine and International Public Health. These classroom venue courses are taught by INMED at the University of Missouri-Kansas City utilizing lectures by experts, workshops in practice skills, case studies, and formation groups to explore personal application.



These courses address five basic bodies of knowledge:

- Determinants of Health those factors that most significantly impact health in low-resource communities
- Diseases of Poverty the medical conditions most frequently encountered in low-income communities
- Cross-Cultural Competence in Health Care those skills necessary to effectively promote health in a new cultural context



- Health Leadership how health care professionals can work in cooperation with communities to design and lead effective health systems
- Personal Skills for Cross-Cultural Living covering cultural adaptation, physical health, personal relationships and financial skills connected with service in poorer communities

Results to date: More than 450 individuals have completed the INMED Online Courses since 2006, and 32 individuals have completed the INMED Intensive Courses since 2009.

International Medicine Certificate, Diploma, and Fellowship

A supervised service-learning experience provides an invaluable complement to didactic study of international medicine. Yet students and medical professionals face a number of barriers in this pursuit, including unavailability of on-site faculty, the uncertainties of travel, and difficulties in assuring academic credit. To this end, INMED offers three levels of training:

- INMED International Medicine Certificate is designed to equip health care professionals in the clinical fields with the basic skills needed to serve in poorer communities. This certificate requires completion of the INMED International Medicine Online Course and at least one month of supervised service-learning at an INMED International Medicine Training Site.
- INMED International Medicine Diploma is intended for those health care professionals in the clinical fields who wish to complement their service-learning experience with a stronger academic foundation. This diploma requires completion of the INMED International Medicine Intensive Course and the INMED International Medicine Certificate or documentation of an equivalent training experience.
- INMED International Medicine Fellowship is offered to physicians intent on a full-time career in the field. It requires completion of the INMED International Medicine Intensive Course and at least 12 months of supervised service-learning at an INMED International Medicine Training Site.

Results to Date: INMED has partnered with faculty at more than 50 medical care facilities in 20 nations. More than 200 health care professionals and students have completed the INMED International Medicine Certificate and Diploma, including 56 during the 2009-2010 academic year who served at INMED Training Sites in 16 different developing countries.

International HIV Medicine Certificate

HIV disease continues to cause great calamity in developing nations and poorer communities. The INMED International HIV Medicine Certificate is designed to equip health care professionals in the clinical fields with both skills and experience to combat HIV in low-resource communities. This certificate

requires completion of the INMED International HIV Medicine Online Course and at least one month of supervised service-learning at an INMED International HIV Medicine Training Site.

International Public Health Certificate and Diploma

Concern over health care for people on the margins of society continues to grow, fueled by globalization, worldwide news coverage, and the ease with which an epidemic or disaster in distant lands can affect other nations within hours. Encouragingly, the most common disease facing poorer communities can be prevented. But success requires uncommon skills. To this end, INMED offers two levels of training:


• INMED International Public Health Certificate equips health care professionals with the basic skills and experience necessary to prevent disease and promote health. This certificate requires completion of the INMED International Public Health Online Course


and at least one month of supervised service-learning at an INMED International Public Health Training Site.

• INMED International Public Health Diploma is intended for those health care professionals desiring to supplement their service-learning experience with a stronger didactic foundation. This diploma requires completion of the INMED International Public Health Intensive Course and the INMED International Public Health Certificate or documentation of an equivalent training experience.







Fred is in his mid-30s and has been HIV positive for 10 years. I met him after one of his multiple admissions to our county hospital for serious opportunistic infections, including overwhelming histoplasmosis (a fungus native to the Mississippi delta). Fred's "CD4" or "T-cell count" was down to 6; a count less than 200 qualifies as AIDS. His bone marrow was infiltrated with fungus and had all but stopped producing blood products. He had no appetite; daily diarrhea had reduced him to skin and bones. He required a host of medications to fight various infections that his body was incapable of resisting. Fred was dying. Though


he knew about his disease and the possibility of treatment, he had never been willing to attend the local public HIV clinic. His reasons were a complex combination of shame, denial, and a culturally rooted distrust of the medical establishment.



Over a series of visits to our health center, we were able to break through to Fred, to establish a degree of trust and then to initiate life-saving anti-HIV medications. By God's grace, the medications worked quickly and powerfully. After less than three months of treatment, Fred's appetite returned and his diarrhea left. Over the next year he gained back more than 60 pounds. Most importantly, the HIV in his blood was suppressed to levels below detectability and his "T cell count" steadily rose until it was safely back in the normal range. We were able to stop all of his protective antibiotics because Fred's immune system regained its power to protect him. Though it had seemed impossible a few months before, Fred

returned to work.

I'll never forget the day, about a year after I met him, when Fred brought his new wife to the clinic to meet me. Both Fred and I are big guys, but when we recalled how far he'd come, we hugged and cried like babies.



This story is about one of my many nameless patients that I met while at Kudjip Nazarene Hospital in Papua New Guinea. He is one-day-old Baby of Maria. When I first met little Baby of, he had stopped breathing. There were some anxious moments as we used the bag mask

to ventilate his tiny lungs, and then amazingly he started breathing again. Over the next couple days, this episode was repeated frequently as he continued having apneic spells. Under the watchful eye of his mother and grandmother, each spell was caught in time for staff to ventilate him with the bag mask until he

began breathing on his own again. In the meantime, he was receiving IV antibiotics and fluids.

Miraculously, after a few anxious days, he started to improve. Each morning I asked his mother if he had had any difficulty breathing, and by the third or fourth day, she started to say no. He's breathing fine! When I left Kudjip, he was still on IV antibiotics but doing

well.

This little baby, who may indeed live to be given a name of his own, is one of the happy stories of a life saved. Lives like this one make medical missions rewarding. But for each Baby of Maria, there was also a life that was lost. Either the child was brought to the hospital too late or not at all. Those

children make medical missions desperately necessary.



International Medicine & Public Health Intensive Courses

Realizing the need for formal, in-class training for health care profession students and professionals who desire to participate in medical missions, INMED launched the International Medicine Intensive Course in June 2009. More than 30 participants gathered in Kansas City from all over the world for this two-week course. They received training from a faculty of 24 experienced international medicine experts. Participants gained a much better grasp of the medical, cultural, public health, and economic aspects of the challenging but deeply rewarding discipline of medical missions. A resident

physician who participated in the course wrote, "I highly recommend the course to anyone who is considering international or cross-cultural work or to those who may already have considerable experience. You will meet like-minded people who share your passion of serving in developing communities and making a difference in the lives of those less fortunate." If you are looking for the next step in international medicine and public health training, then consider registering for a future International Medicine or International Public Health Intensive Course, held each June in Kansas City, Mo.
