



INMED Comninellis Award for Compassionate Service to Humanity



Nizar Mamdani, PhD

Nizar Mamdani, PhD, grew up in Tanzania, East Africa, and received his undergraduate and graduate education in Tokyo, Japan. For twenty years he served as the Executive Director of International Healthcare at the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC). Dr. Mamdani states, "During my extensive travels around the world I developed a profound understanding of the challenges faced by many individuals who have poor eyesight and who have no hope of accessing clear vision. I observed an acute need for affordable, easily accessible corrective eye care solutions." Nizar and his wife, Marsha Davidson-Mamdani, PhD, founded First Sight, a philanthropic organization established to provide free, low-tech, fool-proof, clinically tested, and affordable vision screening and prescription eyeglasses to children and adults in developing countries. Over 139,000 eyeglasses have been distributed by First Sight and its associates to children and adults in 31 countries. First Sight works with Rotary and Lions Clubs, as well as, with many educational, healthcare, NGOs, and faith-based organizations, and continues to make a much-needed positive impact in the lives of its recipients.

INMED International Medicine Award



Susan Aycock, MD

Dr. Aycock started her career as a full-spectrum family physician in rural eastern North Carolina. Her residency prepared her for a concentration in women's health to include obstetrics. After twenty-five years of full-time patient care, Dr. Aycock went to the local health department where she served in family planning and cervical cancer screening. This career move also allowed her to pursue her interest in world missions. As part of her preparation, Susan earned the Master's Degree in International Health (MIH) through INMED. The service component of the program took her to Roatan, Honduras, where she discovered that cervical cancer screening was prohibitively expensive. Dr. Aycock developed a costeffective protocol to screen and manage cervical cancer on the island -- one that continues to be used today. Dr. Aycock states, "I have resolved to develop a tool to win this battle in the service of women worldwide."

INMED National Healthcare Service Award



Pedro Espinoza

Pedro Espinoza is a TED speaker, entrepreneur, AI investor, and author dedicated to driving innovation and inclusion. His books include Differences That Make a Difference, and The Real ROI: Return on Inclusion. Pedro is also the Founder and CEO of Pan Peru USA, a nonprofit that focuses on empowering women entrepreneurs in Peru. Founded in 2018, the program has grown from empowering 1 woman to a total of 75 female entrepreneurs in Pampas Grande, a remote Andean village at 12,600 feet above sea level. Today, these 75 women use their knitting and crochet skills to build their own businesses, crafting 100% handmade alpaca apparel for the global market. All proceeds from sales go directly to these women, providing them with economic independence and sustainable livelihoods. Believing that education is the best tool in the fight against poverty, Pan Peru also improves academics for children in disadvantaged communities by building libraries and computer labs.

INMED Cross-Cultural Healthcare Service Award



Linabelle Finnegan, MA, MBA, Mmin, DMin, MIH

Linabelle grew up in a poverty-stricken community in the Philippines and witnessed first-hand the devastation when healthcare was not easily accessible. Because of this, she planned on studying medicine but "man makes the plans, but God directs his steps". Linabelle's original education was in business and ministry, and in 2024 she also earned the INMED Master's Degree in International Health (MIH), with her scholarly project on Building Self-Sustainable Community to Reduce Poverty and to Fight Human Trafficking. Linabelle is especially interested in community outreach, healthcare planning, infectious disease prevention, and solutions to pressing issues related to global disease breakouts, poverty-related health problems, and the growing population of sexually trafficked children. Locally, Linabelle is actively involved in supporting missions for trafficked children in Mountain Grove, MO, and a home for trafficked pregnant teens in Lee's Summit, MO, and similar work for her community in the Philippines.

INMED International Healthcare Preceptor Award



Safia Ahmed, BScN, MPH, IBCLC, CDE, RN

Safia Ahmed is a public health nurse with over 20 years of experience leading and delivering health services to refugees, newcomer immigrants, and residents in low-income neighborhoods in Toronto. Her particular emphasis has been on strengthening health systems, especially those aimed at maternal and child health with attention to breast-feeding and infant nutrition. In 2023 she earned the INMED Graduate Certificate in International Nursing and Public Health, as well as professional qualifications in Helping Babies Breathe, Helping Mothers Survive, and Essential Care for Every Newborn. Since that time, Safia Ahmed has continued to actively teach these subjects in Kenya, Ethiopia, and Somalia, as well as here at the Humanitarian Health Conference pre-conference courses. Safia states, "Through INMED, I have gained a wealth of knowledge and added many new tools to my toolbox. More than the courses, I have found a supportive family of like-minded individuals at INMED. The community and the quality of education have been truly exceptional."

INMED Humanitarian Crisis Response Award



Jacquelyn Borst, PA-C, DMSc, MIH

Dr. Jacquelyn Borst has been a physician assistant since 2006, serving in hospital medicine, gastroenterology, and urgent care. In 2020, she completed her Doctor of Medical Science from the University of Lynchburg, and in 2023, she graduated from INMED with the Master's in International Health (MIH) where her scholarly project was on creating a Refugee and Immigrant Healthcare course curriculum for her nurse practitioner students at the Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania PA Program. Today, Dr. Borst is the Executive Director of the International Impact through Medicine Foundation - a nonprofit that supports medical projects in Haiti and Honduras. The foundation focuses on providing service opportunities for PAs. In her leadership role, Dr. Borst has led over forty short-term medical service teams to Haiti and Honduras in the last fifteen years, often bringing PA students and providing an inspiring opportunity for these learners to see a vision of service to the world's most vulnerable people.

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

The Higgins Brothers Surgicenter for Hope (HBSH) provides medical, surgical, and emergency/trauma care to people who live in the rural region surrounding Fonds Parisien, Haiti. Opened in December 2016 and expanded in 2022, the fully staffed facility is the only surgical facility/ER running 24/7 in this region of Haiti.In January 2020, the HBSH assumed management of the Christ for All Hospital that includes hospital care for medical and pediatric patients. The Shawn C. Warren Medical Building houses an array of medical, pediatric, HIV, and dental clinics. Currently the Maternity Center is being replaced. As part of its mission, the HBSH also provides training for Haitian surgical residents. Despite Haiti's challenges-increasing gang violence, lack of stable government, natural disasters, political unrest, and extreme poverty, the surgicenter campus' dedicated team continues to meet the needs of patients.

Each speaker brings a wealth of experience, knowledge, and a profound commitment to humanitarian service. Their work has not only advanced global health but also continues to inspire others to go and do likewise.



Susan Aycock, MD

Dr. Aycock started her career as a full-spectrum family practitioner in rural eastern North Carolina. Her residency track prepared her for a concentration in women's health to include obstetrics and colposcopy. After twenty-five years of full-time work Dr. Aycock went to the local health department working two days per week in family planning and running the colposcopy clinic. This freedom allowed her to pursue her interest in world missions. As part of her preparation, Susan earned the Diploma in International Medicine and Public Health (DIMPH) through INMED. The service component of the DIMPH Program took her to Roatan, Honduras where she explored a women's health program. When she asked about cervical evaluations, she discovered the cost equated to a month of income for a family, so it rarely happened. Encouraged by a clinic manager to "come up with a protocol" for cost-effective treatment, Dr. Aycock has pursued this endeavor. In the meantime, the WHO resolved to eliminate cervical cancer as a public health problem. Dr. Aycock states, "I have resolved to develop a tool to win this battle in the service of women worldwide."



Jacquelyn Borst, PA-C, DMSc, MIH

Dr. Jacquelyn Borst graduated from the DeSales University PA Program in 2006. She has practiced in various areas of medicine, including hospital medicine, gastroenterology, and urgent care. In 2020, she completed her DMSc from the University of Lynchburg, and in 2023, she finished her Master's in International Health from the Institute for International Medicine. Dr. Borst is the executive director of the International Impact through Medicine Foundation, a nonprofit that supports medical projects in Haiti and Honduras. The foundation focuses on providing service opportunities for PAs. In her role, she has led over forty short-term medical service trips to Haiti and Honduras in the last fifteen years, often bringing PA students with her. In 2018, she joined the faculty of the Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania PA Program. In 2022, she became the PA Program Director, a position she continues in today.



Nicholas Comninellis, MD, MPH, DIMPH

Nicholas Comninellis is President and Professor of INMED, the Institute for International Medicine. He is also part-time faculty at Research Medical Center Family Medicine Residency. Over a two-year period Dr. Comninellis served inner-city citizens at Shanghai Charity Hospital. Over another two years, he led a healthcare ministry in the war-besieged nation of Angola in southern Africa. Dr. Comninellis next served for six years in the Kansas City public hospital before launching INMED in 2003.

He graduated from the University of Missouri-Kansas City (UMKC) School of Medicine and Saint Louis University School of Public Health and was a family medicine resident at John Peter Smith Hospital. Dr. Comninellis also earned a professional diploma in tropical medicine from the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research and became board certified in both public health and family medicine. Among his authored books are Shanghai Doctor, Where Do I Go From Here, and INMED International Medicine & Public Health. Dr. Comninellis is a classical guitarist and faculty co-advisor for UMKC Cru. Because of this, she planned on studying medicine but "man makes the plans, but God directs his steps". Linabelle's education and training in business, ministry, and international health have provided a well-rounded collection of knowledge and experiences that have benefited her work in a non-clinical capacity. Linabelle is especially interested in community outreach, education, healthcare planning, infectious disease management and prevention, and solutions to pressing issues related to global disease breakouts, poverty-related health problems, and the growing population of sexually trafficked children, men and women. Locally, Linabelle is actively involved in supporting missions for trafficked children in Mountain Grove, MO, and a home for trafficked pregnant teens in Lee's Summit, MO. Linabelle has traveled extensively on church mission trips, as well as for international gymnastics meets for her girls as members of the USA and Philippine National Teams.

The clinic is now the only functioning medical facility in the region of Haiti and cares for 1500 patients monthly.


Anthony Kovac, MD, MIH

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Mercy & Truth Medical Missions sends 3-5 teams abroad annually who work alongside local leaders to meet the healthcare needs of the underserved around the world.

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
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
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
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
